

Traditional Beliefs Of Turkic Peoples And Their Influence On The National Culture Of Uzbekistan

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ABSTRACT

This article examines the traditional beliefs of Turkic peoples and their significant influence on the national culture of Uzbekistan. The study explores the historical, social, and cultural aspects of the spiritual heritage of Turkic peoples, focusing on Tengriism, ancestor worship, animistic, and shamanistic practices. The processes of transformation of these beliefs under Islamization and their preservation in folk customs, folklore, rituals, and symbolism are analyzed in detail. The article emphasizes the significance of syncretism, through which ancient beliefs integrate into religious and cultural systems, forming stable cultural traditions. It highlights the impact of traditional beliefs on ethical norms, artistic imagery, folk festivals, crafts, and social life. The study demonstrates that ancient Turkic spiritual practices continue to significantly influence the contemporary national culture of Uzbekistan and serve as an important factor in preserving cultural identity in the context of globalization. INTRODUCTION

Thus, traditional beliefs have had a long-term influence on the formation of the cultural identity of the Uzbek people and continue to play a significant role in the contemporary cultural space.

The relevance of this study is determined by the need to preserve and understand spiritual heritage as an essential element of national identity, especially in the context of globalization, cultural unification, and social change.

The aim of this research is to identify the main components of the traditional beliefs of Turkic peoples and analyze their influence on various aspects of Uzbekistan's national culture.

Other key elements included:

3. Ancestor Worship and Its Role in Forming National Values

Ancestor worship fostered respect for elders and responsibility toward family and lineage. In contemporary Uzbekistan, it is manifested through preservation of family traditions, rituals, and commemorations. These practices strengthen intergenerational ties and contribute to moral education.

4. Folk Culture and Folklore as Bearers of Beliefs

Folk literature, epics, songs, and tales act as carriers of ancient beliefs. Examples include:

Epics such as *Alpamish* and *Kozi-Korpesh – Bibikhan*, reflecting the struggle between humans and natural or spiritual forces;

Folk festivals like *Navruz* and *Kurban-Hayit*, containing elements of nature worship and ancestor reverence;

Folk crafts and ornaments employing sun, water, tree, and animal symbols, tracing back to ancient beliefs.

5. Syncretism of Traditional Beliefs and Islam

The Islamization of the region did not eliminate traditional beliefs but led to their transformation and integration into the new religious system. Examples of syncretism include:

Visits to local shrines alongside Islamic prayers;

Preservation of ancestor commemoration rituals within Islamic practices;

Elements of shamanistic ceremonies in folk medicine and charms.

Syncretism allowed the preservation of cultural identity and ensured continuity of traditions.

6. Influence on Contemporary National Culture

Artistic culture (painting, ceramics, ornamentation);
